

November 2024 Legislative Report Vice President Wanda Buttner

Good morning, y'all!

Donald J. Trump will be the 47th president of the United States — winning both more than 270 electoral votes and 51 percent of the popular vote, with a current count of over 71 million votes as of the time of writing.

Election night feels a bit like a dream, due in large part to sleep deprivation and excessive caffeine — but also from experiencing first-hand such a historical, grand-slam moment for Texas Republicans while at the victorious Sen. Ted Cruz's (R-TX) watch party. The night truly was a political bloodbath for Texas Democrats, as my editor aptly wrote last night.

Checking in on The 40

Thirty-nine of the 40 Texas congressional members for whom this newsletter is named were up for election on Tuesday night — which continued to favor the red team. GOP candidates claimed a total of 25 Texas U.S. House seats: 1 through 6, 8, 10 through 17, 19, 21 through 27, 31, 36, and 38. Democrats secured 13 seats: 7, 9, 16, 18, 20, 28 through 30, 32 through 35, and 37.

Among the most notable were Congressman Tony Gonzales (R-TX-23) <u>fending off</u> Democratic challenger Santos Limon; Congresswoman Monica De La Cruz's (R-TX-15) <u>defeat</u> of Michelle Vallejo in Congressional District (CD) 15, Rep. Henry Cuellar (D-TX-28) <u>surviving</u> a challenge from Jay Furman in CD 28, and Congressman Vicente Gonzalez's (D-TX-34) <u>victory</u> over former Congresswoman Mayra Flores (R-TX-34).

Democrats survived in both 28 and 34, but it was by the skin of their teeth, setting up another contentious election for the pair next cycle.

And as for the one leftover... Cruz easily dispatched his opponent Congressman Colin Allred (D-TX-32) on Tuesday night, snatching up 1 million more votes and 9 more percentage points than his Democratic challenger.

Compare that to his 215,000-vote and 2.6 percentage point margin six years ago.

While each candidate differed in their campaign strategies and individual wedge issues, a common theme most of the Democrats ran on, both nationally and locally, was abortion and restrictions thereon, while the issue similarly emphasized across the board for Republicans was securing the southern border and prohibiting biological men from competing in female sports.

Tuesday night's results indicate that Democrats may have overestimated the average Texan's fear of Republican officials restricting abortion access, and underestimated their concerns over national security and other issues the GOP has harped on, especially the economy. The abortion issue, as I saw at Vice President Kamala Harris' <u>rally</u> in Houston, was spoken about by Democrats as a human right, a necessary tool for the average American, and most certainly a concern on every woman's mind. Allred took part in this particular gathering's rallying cry for abortion, sending a closing pitch to Texans focused wholly on abortion access. Judging just from the crowd's response in the stadium, one would think the Democrats were spot on.

However, the only poll that matters in the end, the election, proved otherwise.

It may be that access to abortion is of that much importance to a select few of Texans — but evidently is not an overarching topic of relevance for the average voter, whether male or female, as affordability of everything, a secure border, and other GOP promises which appear to be instead.

Johnson's Sigh of Relief

With President-elect Donald Trump set to take the White House come January, U.S. House Speaker Mike Johnson (R-LA-04) can rest a bit easier — even more so if the GOP retains the House.

As we touched upon last week, Trump predicted Johnson will "be around for a long time," a rather significant vote of confidence in the House leader, and a surprising one following some in the GOP's general distaste for Johnson after opposition sprouted up about his foreign aid spending proposals.

Upon the announcement of Trump's victory, Johnson issued a statement that said, "This historic election has proven that a majority of Americans are eager for secure borders, lower costs, peace through strength, and a return to common sense."

"I look forward to working with President Trump and a Republican Senate to deliver as Speaker of the House on the mandate entrusted to us by the American people."

If Harris had been elected instead of Trump, Johnson would have assuredly had less support and clout, as colleagues in the House would have no incentive to pay heed to Trump's opinion on the speaker if he had been defeated, particularly considering the unlikelihood that Trump would run again.

However, with Trump as the president-elect, Johnson gains peace knowing for the moment he has the Republicannominated president's confidence on his side, and in turn the latter's team of loyal GOP members.

Now, this is all assuming Republicans win the House, which they are poised to do — but it's not guaranteed yet. If Republicans keep the House, all looks well for Johnson as speaker for the time being. Yet, if Democrats earn a majority in the House, Johnson will likely be facing a competitive race for minority leader instead, leaving him in the defensive position — likely against a party with new ideas regarding leadership after losing a majority. Perhaps Trump's endorsement will impact that, but it'll likely have more power if the Republicans feel snug in their potential majority position over the House.

Cornyn's Comments on a Senate Secured

Speaking of a Republican House and confident proclamations, the GOP now has a majority in the Senate, a result of Election Day that many saw coming.

Sen. John Cornyn (R-TX), who is gunning for the role of Senate Majority Leader, was quick to share his analysis of the general election.

"Tonight, the American people have roundly rejected Chuck Schumer and the Senate Democrat majority's years of disastrous border policies, reckless spending, and failed management that has caused the Senate to lurch from one avoidable crisis to the next," Cornyn said.

"Chuck Schumer has broken the Senate, but I'm confident our new conservative majority can restore our institution to the essential role it serves in our constitutional republic."

As the top-dog fundraiser in the majority leader race-to-the-top, Cornyn is known to flaunt his power, particularly through his bipartisan track record and impressive fundraising credentials. According to a Bloomberg report from February, Cornyn far outpaces the other two competitors for the role — Senate Minority Whip John Thune (R-SD) and Sen. John Barrasso (R-WY) — in terms of monetary contributions to colleagues and candidates by over \$20 million.

"From my experience both as Whip advancing President Trump's agenda through the Senate to serving as a rank-andfile member now, I have learned what works and what does not," he said.

In September, Cornyn sent out a letter to senators to express "immense gratitude" and a "sense of shared accomplishment" for having raised over \$406 million since his entry into the Senate in 2002.

"We will restore the important role of Senate committees and reestablish the regular appropriations process. We will improve communication, increase transparency, and tap into the wealth of talent in the conference to include everyone's expertise and opinions."

Cornyn shared his plans for altering the way his caucus' top spot interacts with its members: "And we will return power back to the members; there will be no more backroom deals or forced votes on bills without adequate time for review, debate, and amendment."

Cornyn is prominent, relevant, and, many in Texas hope, an imminent majority leader... and he's making his case for it.

As Trump prepares to take on Washington, D.C. in January, the House will likely see a fair amount of change and shift in priorities, which we'll be jotting down and sharing with y'all as it develops.






